- o Brilliant business women
- o Translated SS into vernacular so followers would understand SS
- Trained young women in danger of sliding into prostitution due to poverty so learned valuable skills
- o Educated children
- Pietas and other artwork commissioned

PREACHED (INTERDICT)

- ✓ the HOLYFOOL = Christina the Astonishing d. 1224
- ✓ d. 1380 Catherine of Siena (mantellate) & Doctor of the Church
- Her visions were written down in the form of a dialogue between she and God
- Tearned for complete unity with God
- Better known example of one who passion for God called her to challenge corruption (and even "lukewarm-ness" among clergy and religious)
- bedience to the Word of God. And she speaks of the **cell of self-knowledge**. Like the desert ascetics who taught: *Stay in you cell and your cell will teach you everything*. Catherine speaks of the *Cell of your Soul*.
- ministry flows from the depths of her prayer
- ther love was incarnate: she secretly gave provisions to poor and destitute people, often in the early hours before others rose from sleep
 - o For example –

I know you're going to ask me, since I talk so much about agape love, "but what if I have no such unconditional love in me and no great tenderness (and I don't), and yet you say without such love I'm powerless; so then, how can I get it?"

I'll tell you how: Love is only had by loving. So be up and doing. And remember that there's nothing so difficult and no stronghold so impregnable, that it can't be broken down (and built up) by Love.
